Many can well imagine how painful it is after any one you love has died. What I observed during this long, difficult, challenging time is a woman who connected to others with care & support & generosity. I often witnessed Dorothy offering a kind word, a small comforting 'gift', a coveted insight, a hug, and/or a humorous aside (sometimes many of these at the same time!). She shared her own story in ways which were helpful for so many. Even in her own pain, Dorothy often presented a robust, feisty perspective which was endearing and fun. As you know, Dorothy well knew how to 'stick to her guns'! She was certainly no caricature of a 'senior citizen'. Dorothy welcomed all group new-comers, helping integrate them into the 'fold'. She was a regular attendee in both the weekly group & the weekly diners, in addition to other engagements with those she had grown to know closely after Eto died. As you may know, it is not everyone who is able to find & cultivate new & deep friendships after the death of one's life-long partner. That she persisted in sharing in community, even when some of her pain continued, is a testament to her life-force & interest in life and what makes it, & herself, not only 'tick'. . .but also worthwhile. There is no doubt she loved her family as they were consistently in her thoughts & comments & well-wishes. Dorothy invited us into her life with kindness, letting us glimpse some of her deepest dreams. Those of us who accepted her invitation to connect have been well rewarded. Thus, as is life's nature, we have our own griefs in her absence in the manifest world, while we feel honored to gather to appreciate her life at this time of her passing out of this physical realm.
