In Memory of My Aunt Pui A few days ago, my mom called me to let me know that my aunt had passed away late evening of March 18, 2014. I can't say my heart was shattered into a million pieces. But I was saddened. Sadden that a light has gone out, sadden in knowing the unbearable pain my uncle and cousins must be bearing. My cousins lost their mother and my uncle lost his wife. I could honestly say I knew the pain and loss they are all feeling for I had lost my father. The little that I knew of Aunt Pui, I knew she was born in a small village in China. She was educated, she was a school teacher in the village, and she played a Chinese traditional instrument called "Young Ching". She married my uncle sixty six years ago, and they have five children. Her fate was very much tied to China's culture revolution. Her husband (my uncle) was not allow to leave China to join her in Hong Kong, so she was left along to rise their five children by herself for many years. From conversations with family, I know aunt was a private, self-contained person. She was kind, gentle, sensitive and sympathetic. As I think of my Aunt Pui, I think of her generosity. Before my family immigrated to Untied States, my mom and my siblings were in Hong Kong for many months waiting for my father. Knowing we didn't have a place to stay or means of living, she graciously extended her help. She welcomed us into her home. As cousins & elders in the family will tell you, I and my siblings were not the best mannered or best behaved children. We were loud, augmentative, restless, and sometimes combatant. But she putted up with us and loved us like family. For that I am and will be forever grateful. As I grew up, got married, living several hundred miles apart, I didn't see Aunt Pui much except on two occasions. I realize that there are a lot of things I never got to know about Aunt Pui's life. But that does not stop the sad feeling of another chunk of my world had slipped away and when I speak of her now is forever in past tense. Grieving through the death of my father, I have taken the time to sit and think about what he meant to me, how he impacted my life and choices I made. You read and hear stories about people, before death, said that they would not be missed and that they had not really accomplished anything or made a difference in life. I disagree with this. People touch others' lives in so many different ways without knowing it. I know this is true my Aunt Pui. She touched my life, the life of her husband, children, and grandchildren.
