I'll never forget when he first got his condo in North Shore. Without a second thought, he opened his doors to me, my wife, my daughter, and my mother-in-law. That was just who he was—kind, welcoming, and always thinking of others. But as I look back on our 20-year friendship, one moment stands out above the rest. It was the night we met. I had just moved to San Jose and my neighbor, Jim, invited me to a poker game in San Mateo. I didn't know a soul there. Then I met Andy. As the night went on, I kept thinking to myself, "Do I know this guy from somewhere?" He was talking to me like we'd known each other for a lifetime.
