“ Without Y. K. I couldn't have the chance to join Radifusion (RTV) 麗的電視 in 1967 summer time. It was the last day for RTV enrollment for Artist training class. When we finished office work at B of A at 5pm I asked and Y. K. was kind enough to accompany me for the enrollment.
